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Ι.

Objectives of the International Benchrest Shooters

The development and encouragement of uniform competition to achieve extreme accuracy in firearms, ammunition, equipment and shooting method.

To standardize on an international basis the entire Benchrest shooting program so that the targets, ranges, scoring methods, records and match procedures will be uniform and comparable.

To assist and encourage any individual or organization in the promotion of Benchrest Shooting.

To gather and make available to its members pertinent statistics and technical data.

Safe firearms not qualifying under the definition of various classes set out herein, may be fired in any tournament provided the shooters and competitors be informed that he/she is not eligible for any records, awards, prizes or place in the aggregate, and provided that the range facilities are conveniently available. Should any person develop any rifle, and/or equipment that do not meet existing rules and classifications, the rifle or equipment may be submitted to the directors for evaluation and approval or disapproval.

20 II. Definitions

- A) Bench: A bench shall be a rigidly constructed table of a height to permit a shooter of average height to sit at comfortably by increasing or decreasing the height of the stool on which they sit. It shall be constructed to permit firing from either the right or left side equally.
- B) Club: An affiliated Club, as defined in the By-Laws of the Association, or an individual of the Association who owns, leases or controls a range meeting the specifications of a range suitable for holding a Registered Benchrest Tournament may be a Club.
- C) Range for Registered Tournaments: A place to shoot not having less than 5 benches on the firing line: it shall have sturdy target frames at measured distances for the firing line not less than 50 yards/meters, preferably 50 and 100 yards/meters.
- D) Firing Line: The firing line shall preferably be coincident with the forward edge of the bench, but if it's to the rear of that line, then it shall be conspicuously marked on the bench.
- E) Tournament: A tournament is an orderly program of competitive shooting. The words "shoot" and "meet" are synonymous.
- 41 F) Match: A match is a single event in a tournament

43 44 45 46	G) Registered Tournaments: A tournament authorized by the appropriate office of the IBS and conducted under these Rules and Regulations in accordance with the official tournament procedures approved by the IBS as set forth in Section III of these <u>Rules</u> .
47	H) Rests:
48	1. Unlimited Class
49	a. Any rest, including one-piece rests, may be used as long as they are not
49 50	fastened in any way to the bench. A vertical spacer under the rest will be
51	allowed as long it contains no adjustments for windage or elevation. The
52	vertical spacer shall not contain any protrusions, which can be inserted into
53	the bench top or sandbag that sits upon it. Any Bipod may be used in place
54	of the front rest. A rail may be added to the stock solely for the purpose of
55	attaching a bipod. If the rail is wider than a standard picatinny rail (2) it
56	must be removed if not using a bipod.
57	
58	2. Custom and Factory Class
59	a. A front rest shall support the front part of a rifle: a rear rest shall support the
60	rear part of a rifle; neither rest may be attached to the bench, the rifle, or to
61	the other. The rear sandbag shall be a bag or combination of bags containing
62	sand only. Zirconium silicate, known as "heavy sand" is allowed. No other
63	metallic sand can be used. A vertical spacer under the rear bag will be
64	allowed as long it contains no adjustments for windage or elevation. The
65	vertical spacer shall not contain any protrusions, which can be inserted into
66	the bench top or sandbag that sits upon it. The rear sandbag shall not be
67	contained in any manner. The rear sandbag cannot in any way be attached
68	to the front rest.
69	
70	The front sandbag must be such that the rifle can be easily removed in the
71	vertical direction without any front sandbag adjustment. The bag must also
72	be designed to maintain 100% contact with the bottom of the fore-end when
73	in its shooting position. The front bag shall also be a minimum of ${}^{1\!\!/}_{2}$ inch thick
74	in the vertical direction within the width of the fore-end. A mechanical or
75	integral support system of the sandbag are allowed, if there is no contact
76	with the Rifle or fore stock. The Rifle must be in contact with the Sandbag
77	only!
78	Any bipod is permitted as a replacement for the front rest and may be
79	attached to the stock. A rail may be added to the stock solely for the purpose
80	of attaching a bipod. If the rail is wider than a standard picatinny rail (~1") it
81	must be removed if not using a bipod.
82	
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- 83 I) Guiding Means: Any devise, addition, contour or dimension on any rifle of any class, 84 designed or adapted to co-act with mating or reciprocal features of a rest to guide its 85 return to firing position so that it shall not be necessary to re-aim the rifle optically for 86 each shot shall be conclusively deemed to constitute guiding means and are not 87 allowed.
- J) ECI Empty Chamber Indicator: a device to be inserted into the empty chamber of a
 rifle to insure and visually demonstrate that the rifle is in an unloaded and safe
 condition.
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- 92 III. Tournament Procedures
- A) Tournaments
- 94 1) Types of tournaments
- 95Tournaments shall be of two general classes: Registered and Unregistered. Only96Registered Tournaments shall be considered for record purposes.
- 97 2) Registered Tournaments
- 98 Only clubs affiliated with IBS, which are in good standing, and which have the 99 facilities and equipment required to conduct a shoot under the procedures 100 required by the association may hold registered tournaments. Registered 101 Tournaments shall be held only on dates approved by the Chairperson of the 102 Board of Directors (hereafter referred to as "First Vice President").
- 1033) Approval of Tournaments Dates
- 104a) Any Club desiring to hold a Registered Benchrest Tournament shall apply for105assignment of a date for such a Tournament
- 106b) The application shall be in the form of a contract entitled "Registered107Tournament" signed by the applicant. The application shall be sent to the First108Vice President and delivered to this officer not less than 30 days before the109Tournament's proposed date. The application shall state:
 - The name and address of the host club making the application
 - ii) The location of the range on which the tournament is proposed to be held
- 113iii)A program of events to be scheduled. IBS match contracts shall include114a provision allowing the host club to insert the types of multiple gun

115	aggregates contested. International Championships are excluded from
116	this provision.
117	c) The First Vice President shall examine the application, consult other
118	tournament schedules, and if the range facilities are approved and no
119	interference with other tournaments exists, shall assign the requested date to
120	the applying club.
121	4) IBS Championship Tournaments shall be conducted, if possible, in areas of easiest
122	accessibility to greatest number of IBS competitors. Suitable accommodations and
123	range facilities will also be a factor in selecting the site of Championship
124	Tournaments. Interpretation of the word "suitable" shall be left to the discretion of
125	the First Vice President.
126	5) Competitors. Subject to eligibility rules of the Club conducting the shoot and
127	complying with Registration requirements, any shooter may compete in a Registered
128	Tournament.
129	Types of Tournaments: "Unlimited", "Custom", "Vintage" and "Factory"
130	
131	
132	B) Registration
133	1) All competitors at every Registered Tournament shall be required to complete a
134	registration form supplied by the IBS and to produce, for inspection, a current IBS,
135	or IBS International membership card. Host Club may waive match fee for first
136	match only. IBS membership is required. The IBS membership requirement for
137	individuals is suspended for Rimfire competition for the provisional period during
138	calendar year 2024.
139	2) The Host Club shall forward to the headquarters of IBS within four weeks of the
140	Tournament, all registration cards together with a registration fee of two dollars
141	per shooter per day.
142	C) Registration Fees
143	1) Each Competitor shall be charged (or have paid on their behalf) a registration fee
144	for each day for each class in which they compete. (It is customary for the Host
145	Club to pay the IBS President fees). At its option, The Host Club may charge a
146	registration fee not greater than may be approved by the Directors or may
147	conduct the match and pay the prescribed IBS registration fee at the expense of
1 4 0	

148 its own treasury.

149		2) A Registration fee of \$20.00 for each Day's course of fire in Championship
150		Tournaments is the maximum fee heretofore approved. If both stages are fired in
151		one day an additional \$20.00 may be charged.
152		3) Any non-member may pay the prescribed annual dues at any Registered
153		Tournament and become a member of the IBS.
154	4	4) If any individual shall fail to have a membership card and is unable to furnish
155		reasonable proof of membership by other methods, he/she shall pay, or have paid
156		on their behalf, the IBS membership fee, and upon proof from records that he/she
157		was, on the date of the Tournament, a member in good standing, a refund shall
158		be made to him/her or the Host club as the facts may require.
159	1	5) IBS Junior members (17 and under) registration fees shall be set at ½ the fees for
160		adults.
161		6) Preregistration for IBS championships shall be required at least 30 days in advance
162		of the Championships. Prepayment of fees is not required. However, a written
163		declaration of intent to attend is required. There will be a mandatory late fee of
164		\$10.00 assessed for all registrations received after 30 days prior to the
165		Championship. Should a preregistered competitor be unable to attend, the total
166		fees paid will be refunded.

	D)	Match Entry Eggs

168 169		1) At IBS Registered Tournaments, competitors will not be required to pay the cash
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188 189 190 191 192	·	Selection of Relays Clubs conducting Registered Tournaments have the privilege of permitting competitors to select their relay, but the clubs cannot alter the IBS rule governing the selection of benches. (see III.H. 1-9)
193 194 195 196 197 198 199 200 201 201 202 203	·	 Appointment of Tournament Officials 1) In all Registered Tournaments there shall be a Range Officer, Three Referees and an Alternate, a Statistician, and an Official Scorer. The Purpose of the alternate referee is to act in the place of any referee who is shooting and who requests one of their targets to be rescored. Under no circumstances shall a referee judge their own target. 2) All Officials at Championship Tournaments must be approved by the IBS President. 3) No Official, except Referees, shall participate as Contestants in a Championship Tournament in which they are an Official. At the discretion of the host IBS club, a range official may shoot if they are not responsible for providing Range Officer supervision for a Match in which they are participating.
204 205 206 207 208		 4) Referees must be IBS members in good standing 5) In all Registered Tournaments, Committee members or Executive Board members cannot serve as Referees.
209	H)	Drawing for Benches
210		1) The Host Club through its representative shall conduct a drawing for benches.
211		One of the Referees or Statistician shall be present to see the drawing is fairly
212		conducted and to represent shooters not present when called upon to draw.
213		2) Late competitors must draw their benches by lot in presence of the Match
214		director, Referee or Statistician.
215		3) Clubs have the option of having but one drawing and requiring each competitor
216		to shoot from the same bench for all matches at all ranges or they may allow two
217		drawings- one for matches at the first distance and one for the matches at the
218		second distance.
219		4) Having drawn a bench or benches, a competitor will not be permitted to make any
220		further changes in relays or benches, except when through some physical
221		condition a hardship results, in which case the Range Officer may change the
222		assignment of bench or relay or both in such a way as to relieve the hardship.
223		5) At Championship Tournaments a system of bench rotation shall be used, whereby
224		each competitor shall draw by their competitor or bench number for the first
225		event of each day or at each range, and for each following event shall move a
226		predetermined number of benches. They may be assigned the same competitor
227 228		number for all subsequent events at the same Tournament.
228 229		6) Since rotation of benches is required at IBS Championships and preregistration is also mandatory, the Host Club may draw benches for competitors and assign
223		also manuatory, the flost club may draw benches for competitors and assign

230 231 232 233 234 235 236 237 238 239 240 241 242		 benches for physical hardships prior to Tournament occurring. This helps to speed up registration at the Tournament and reduces complications. 7) Bench rotation may be used at any IBS registered tournament when so elected by the Host Club. 8) Host Clubs must state in their program for each Tournament whether they will draw for bench assignments or they will use the bench rotation system. 9) A competitor may identify up to three additional competitors to share bench rotation at the time of bench drawing. They must declare the other individual(s) prior to any of the individuals drawing for benches. Pre-registration is encouraged. The Host Club will accommodate the request up to available benches on currently open relays.
243	I)	Inspection of Equipment
244	,	1) All competitors shall declare which Classification of rifle they will be shooting at
245		time of registration. If two classes are to be fired by the same competitor, both
246		shall be declared and assigned to separate relays. It is up to the competitor to
247		present the correct class rifle on the corresponding relay. It is further the
248		responsibility of the competitor to ensure his or her equipment meets the class
249		requirements prior to beginning the match.
250		2) The Referees shall inspect every rifle on the firing line at all State, Regional and
251		National Championships, preferably as the competitor leaves the firing line, but at
252		the Referees discretion, during the firing of the matches. At the balance of IBS
253 254		registered tournaments, referees will conduct random rifle configuration checks and will inspect rifles and rests to ensure that rifles will be removable from their
254 255		front rests without lifting any part of the front rest from its contact points with the
255		bench it is occupying. These two checks are the minimum checks that must be
257		done at all IBS registered matches, before or after a tournament has started.
258		3) Referees will spot check at their discretion rifle configuration and rests. A rifle
259		found to be fitted with illegal components or an illegal rest will result in
260		disqualification of the offending competitor from the aggregate of the Registered
261		tournament in which the illegal equipment is deemed to have been used.
262		
263		
264	J)	Protests and Appeals
265		1) A fee of \$10.00 shall be in place for any target to be rescored. If the target changes
266		score the fee shall be returned to the shooter-otherwise the fee shall be forfeited
267		to the club holding the match. No target may be removed from the," Wailing Wall"
268		or any other designated target display fixture until all protest periods have expired
269 270		for that Match. Removal of targets from the Wailing Wall or other target display fixtures by any person other than the Referees, Range/Safety Officer, Scorer or
270		Match Director will result in disqualification from the Tournament. Any
272		competitor found altering, manipulating or changing a target to change the
273		scoring results on a target will be disqualified from the Tournament.

274	2) Any Competitor in a Registered Tournament, who feels aggrieved at a decision of
275	the Range Officer, or Referees, may before leaving the range on the day the
276	grievance arose, upon payment of \$10.00 appeal the decision by filing a written
277	notice of appeal with the Range Officer. The full written grievance must be mailed
278	to the score committee and postmarked within 48 hours of the tournament. The
279	statement needs to include.
280	a) Reason for appeal
281	b) Rule being broken
282	c) Names of Referees, Range Officer, Scorer, etc.
283	d) Name of Competitor
284	e) Statement must be signed
285	The Rimfire committee will investigate the appeal and forward the findings to
286	the E-Board, The E-Board's decision is final. If the appeal is upheld, the protest
287	fee will be returned. If the appeal is overruled, the fee will be forfeited to the
288	IBS.
289	Grievance shall be mailed to: IBS XXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXX
290	
291	K) Official Score Bulletins
292	, The Tournament Sponsor shall supply every registered competitor with a copy of the
293	official score bulletin which shall be a complete record of all Scores fired and
294	Registered Tournament aggregates. Equipment data shall be listed for a minimum of
295	the top 20 Competitors at Championship Tournaments and top 10 at all other
296	Registered Tournaments.
297	
298	L) Programs
299	Upon receiving assignment of the Tournament date, the Host Club may prepare a
300	program for circulation to interested shooters. Posting of the Tournament dates on
301	the IBS website satisfies this rule. The program shall state:
302	1) The name of the Host Club, the location of the Range, and the date of the
303	Tournament.
304	2) The schedule of Events
305	3) The amount of the Registration fee.
306	a) Where offered- the entry fee for each match and a statement that no entry
307	fee shall be required of anyone not desiring to compete for awards.
308	b) A schedule of Cash Awards expressed as a percentage of entry fees collected
309	c) A statement as to whether a drawing for benches shall follow the
310	requirements for Championship Tournament and if not, the number of
311	Drawings.
312	d) The names, address and telephone number of the Secretary and Director of
313	the Club.
314	
315	

316	Conduct of Tournaments
317	1) Target Detail
318	a) A Target Retrieval Officer shall be appointed by the Host Club and shall be
319	under the immediate control of the Target Captain who shall direct the
320	activities of the crew within the authority reposed in the Captain by the Host
321	Club. The Range Officer shall supervise handling of the targets before and after
322	being placed on and taken off the range. The Target Captain shall be charged
323	with the proper marking and identification of every target and its backer. The
324	marking shall be marked on each target in number easily identifiable from the
325	bench. The retrieval officer shall perform the orderly removal of targets from
326	the frames and the orderly delivery of targets to the Official Scorer. They shall
327	see that the same order is preserved with respect to the backers. They shall
328	not enter the range except by order of the Range Officer and shall be
329	responsible for removal of the crew from positions of hazard giving the "All
330	Clear" signal to the Range Officer.
331	b) The foregoing responsibilities shall be met by the observance of a standard
332	operating procedure, in which they shall be instructed by the Range Officer.
333	The following procedure is suggested: Prior to the Tournament, an estimate of
334	the attendance and an estimate of the number of the entries in the several
335	classes shall be made. Enough targets shall be prepared to provide enough for
336	each relay in each class for the first match.
337	c) After completion of bench assignments, the Statistician shall prepare and
338	furnish the Range Officer and the Captain of the Target Detail with a copy of
339	the Range Officer Tally, which shall show which competitor occupies each
340	bench in each relay of each match, thereby furnishing information necessary
341	to complete the identification marking of the targets for matches subsequent
342	to match number one, and to avoid preparing targets for any inactive benches.
343	d) The Range Officer shall inspect the target frames, target covers, if any, and the
344	backer system, and see that all defects are corrected prior to a match.
345	e) At the discretion of the Match Director, The Captain of the Target Detail shall
346	distribute the prepared targets to each of the competitors of a match or
347	members of the target crew and instruct them in the theory and practice of
348	keeping targets in order and shall demonstrate the methods to be followed to
349	ensure this result. The Competitors <u>or</u> the designated target crew as specified
350	are responsible for securely attaching the proper target to the target frames
351	after the retrieval officer has completed removing the fired targets. No one
352	shall proceed down range until instructed by the Range Officer.
353	f) The Captain shall be the last person to leave the range.
354	g) No one can alter or add to targets, target frames, backers and stationary
355	backers without permission of the match director.
356	
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358	

359	2) Preliminary
360	There may or may not be an opening ceremony prior to the Tournament events.
361	If there is one, the Range Officer will wait until it is over before calling the first
362	relay to the first match. The Target detail may still be on the Range, but the
363	preliminaries do not require an empty range.

365	3) General Instructions
366	At each Tournament the following will be read by the range officer to each relay
367	prior to the first match of the day of the tournament. All competitors for that relay
368	must be at their bench before the range officer can begin to read the safety
369	instructions. Playing a recording of the instructions is acceptable.
370	
371	The Safety Instructions to be Read are as follows:
372	
372	Bolts and cartridges must always be out of the rifle except between the commands
374	"Commence Fire" and "Cease Fire". In the loading area only, you may insert a
375	stripped and flagged bolt. Having the bolt in the gun at any other time during the
376	Registered Tournament will result in disqualification of the offending competitor
377	from the current match and the remainder of the tournament.
378	
379	It is mandatory for any rifle, other than a bolt action, to have the action open,
380	magazine removed or empty and an empty chamber indicator installed at all
381	times, except on the firing line between the appropriate commands given by the
382	Range Officer. The ONLY exception is if the rifle is the loading area and being
383	actively cleaned.
384	
385	A shot fired after the "Cease Fire" will result in disqualification of the offending
386	competitor from the current match and the remainder of the aggregate. Any shots
387	fired prior to "Commence Fire" will likewise result in disqualification of the
388	offending competitor from the entire tournament.
389	
390	If I must stop a match prematurely, you will hear an Air Horn or loud Buzzer, then
391	the Command "Cease Fire". You must leave your rifle alone and wait for follow up
392	commands. A shot after the "Cease Fire" will result in a DQ. Once the situation has
393	been assessed, I will give further instructions. If it is a safety incident, all rifles are
394	to be left untouched until I give other instruction. Otherwise, I will tell you to clear
395	your rifle by firing or by opening your bolts. Before the target crew moves forward,
396	all bolts must be out, and you must step back from your bench. Any time lost will
397	not be charged against your allotted time, and an extra minute will be added to
398	the remaining time, not to exceed the original time allotted.
399	a) At every relay of every match the Range Officer shall announce in exactly these
400	words: "This is match number relay number You will be
401	allowed minutes to complete your firing. Beginning at five minutes

400	
402	before the time limit shall expire, there will be a final countdown as follows: 5
403	Minutes, 2 minutes, 1 minute, 30 seconds, 15 seconds, and cease fire."
404	Please check your competitor and bench #, and please, check your bores,
405	"Ready on the Right, ready on the Left, Ready on the firing line, commence
406	firing".
407	b) In order for the Range Officer and/or Safety Officer to maintain safe control of
408	the firing line, all competitors are to remain seated and quiet at their assigned
409	bench until the Range Officer gives the "Clear the Benches" command
410	c) When the match time has expired or when the last shooter has finished their
411	string of fire, whichever shall be earlier, the Range Officer will give the
412	following commands:
413	"Cease Fire. Remove your Bolts. Remove or empty any fixed magazines. Insert
414	ECI's and remain seated. Show your Bolts over your head or raise your hand to
415	indicate clear".
416	d) This applies to anytime that a "cease fire" is called and the benches must be
417	cleared to allow target crew or others down range.
418	e) At this point the Range Officer will visually inspect the firing line, with help
419	from appointed Safety Officers, as appropriate, who will signal the Range
420	Officer that all bolts are out with a thumbs up sign. Once the Range Officer
421	confirms that the line is safe, they shall command: "Clear the Benches".
422	f) The Range Officer is in charge of the Target Detail and the Target Detail is not
423	to enter the range until the Range Officer has cleared the firing line and has
424	given the target crew the command to go down range.
425	g) Bolts will be removed from all rifles, Non-Bolt guns shall have empty chamber
426	indicators installed and rifles with magazines shall have them removed during
427	the course of the tournament, at all times, except between appropriate
428	commands given by the Range Officer.
429	
430	4) Preparation and Use of Forms
431	The Statistician shall have supervision and control of any statistical forms used in
432	the conduct of the tournament, and shall be responsible for all entries made
433	therein. If any entry of a scoring figure shall prove to be in error, the statistician
434	shall make a correction.
435	a) Basic Form
436	The Basic Form Registration Data (RD), or equivalent heretofore referred to,
437	shall be used in the preparation of all other forms.
438	b) Other Forms:
439	, All other Forms should for the sake of uniformity, be obtained from the IBS.
440	Irrespective of the order in which registrants were entered on the form RD,
441	the succeeding forms should list them in the order of bench or target number,
442	thereby reducing the chance of erroneous entry as targets are scored.
443	c) Additional Club Material:
444	In addition to the basic form RD and registration cards, the Host Club should
445	have:

446 a) Identification tags with competitor numbers, bench number and relay. 447 b) Range Officer tally giving name and bench number of each contestant of 448 each relay. c) The Club shall post score for review by competitors. 449 d) Forms for application for IBS Membership. 450 5) Duties of Tournament Officials 451 452 a) Range Officer: 453 The RSO shall conduct the matches and supervise the competitors. The RSO 454 shall direct the actions of the Target Detail while on the range and shall enforce 455 all Safety rules. In the event of boisterous or unsportsmanlike conduct of a 456 competitor, the Range Officer shall first caution the competitor about their 457 behavior. If the offense is repeated, the result will be disgualification of the offending competitor from the current match and the remainder of the 458 aggregate. Refusal to comply with the Range Officer shall be grounds for 459 barring a competitor from the Range. In the event of any situation arriving (e.g. 460 461 Act of God), procedures for which are not covered by these rules, the Range Officer has full authority to stop the match and after consultation with the 462 463 referees, announce a binding decision or procedure, which shall be final and binding. Any such occurrence shall be fully reported to the Board of Directors 464 by the Head Referee for possible remedial legislation. Such report shall be in 465 466 writing. 467 b) Referees 468 The Referees shall inspect the equipment of competitors according to Rule III. H) Inspection of Equipment, page 9, and pass upon whether such equipment 469 470 complies with the requirements of the class in which the shooter is competing. 471 If found to be in noncompliance, prior the beginning of the match, the shooter 472 shall be given the right to correct, to shoot in a class in which their equipment does qualify, provided that the shooter has not shot any part of the Registered 473 474 Tournament or to file a protest and shoot under protest. The Referees shall investigate any complaints of conduct on the range, hardship in the 475 476 assignment of benches, alleged crossfires and similar matters and shall report 477 their findings to the Range Officer who shall enforce their decision. Shooters 478 are encouraged to have their rifles checked by the referees, prior to the match 479 to check for weight, dimension and proper classification of rifles. c) Statistician: 480 The Statistician shall have charge of the Target Detail while off the range and 481 482 shall arrange for the orderly reception of the targets by the official scorer. The statistician shall supervise the work of the scoring detail and shall collect the 483 scored targets from the scoring detail and enter the scores on form M&AS or 484 485 into the scoring program. 


